

The Essential Guide to Hurricane Preparedness

Each year hurricane season begins on June 1st and lasts 5 months, with storms typically peaking in August and September. As with every hurricane season regardless of forecast, knowing the essentials of how to prepare could truly be a life saver.

Hurricane Knowledge

First, know your hurricane facts and understand common terms used during hurricane forecasts. Storm conditions can vary on the intensity, size and even the angle which the tropical cyclone approaches your area, so it is vital you understand what the forecasters and news reporters are telling you.

Tropical Depressions are cyclones with winds of 38 mph. Tropical Storms vary in wind speeds from 39-73 mph while Hurricanes have winds 74 mph and greater. Typically the upper right quadrant of the storm (the center wrapping around the eye) is the most intense portion of the storm. The greatest threats are damaging winds, storm surge and flooding. This is in part why Hurricane Katrina was so catastrophic when bringing up to 28 foot storm surges onto the Louisiana and Mississippi coastlines.

Here are some important terms you may hear:

- Tropical Storm Watch: Tropical storm conditions are possible in the area.
- Hurricane Watch: Hurricane conditions are possible in the area.

Watches are issued 48 hours in advance of the anticipated onset of tropical storm force winds.

- Tropical Storm Warning: Tropical storm conditions are expected in the area.
- Hurricane Warning: Hurricane conditions are expected in the area.

Warnings are issued 36 hours in advance of tropical storm force winds.

- Eye: Clear, sometimes well-defined center of the storm with calmer conditions.
- Eye Wall: Surrounding the eye, contains some of the most severe weather of the storm with the highest wind speed and largest precipitation.
- Rain Bands: Bands coming off the cyclone that produce severe weather conditions such as heavy rain, wind and tornadoes.
- Storm Surge: An often underestimated and deadly result of ocean water swelling as a result of a landfalling storm, and quickly flooding coastal and sometimes areas further inland.

During a watch, prepare your home and evacuation plan in case a warning is issued. During a warning, carefully follow the directions of officials, and immediately leave the area if they advise it. In the event of an Extreme Wind Warning/ Advisory, which means that extreme sustained winds of 115 mph or greater are expected to begin within an hour, immediately take shelter in the interior portion of a well-built structure.

Hurricane Forecasts

Predicting a tropical cyclone's path can be challenging; there are many global and local factors that come into play. The storm's size and path can directly influence what sort of wind patterns guide, enhance or hinder its growth, and vice versa! Forecasters have computers that take huge amounts of data and try to predict where the storm will go and usually can calculate 2-3 days out fairly accurately. This is where you hear the terms computer models and spaghetti models being used. Generally the forecast track or path is given with the average consensus of these models. The National Hurricane Center has the most up-to-date information on tropical cyclone developments, forecasts and weather alerts, discussions analyzing the data and more. https://www.nhc.noaa.gov/

Hurricane Names

Hurricane names are picked randomly, then rotated and recycled every 6 years. If a hurricane was catastrophic or severely deadly and costly (i.e. Charlie, Katrina, Irene) it is officially retired since use is not appropriate and can be confusing when naming current storms. Hurricane Kits

It is important to create a kit of supplies that you could take with you if you are forced to evacuate. This kit will also be useful if you are able to stay in your home, but are still affected by the storm, such as through the loss of power. One common trend seen when hurricanes are approaching is a wide-spread panic. When this happens, people rush in large numbers to get all the supplies they think they need. However, if you prepare your kit ahead of time, you can alleviate a lot of the potential stress of a very chaotic situation. You should create your kit in a bag that you can easily take with you. Some recommended items to include are:

- Non-perishable food (enough to last at least 3 days)
- Water (enough to last at least 3 days)
- First-aid kit (include any prescription medication you may need)
- Personal hygiene items and sanitation items
- Flashlights (have extra batteries on hand)
- Battery operated radio (again, have extra batteries)
- Waterproof container with cash and important documents
- Manual can opener
- Lighter or matches
- Books, magazines, games for recreation
- Special needs items: pet supplies and baby supplies if applicable
- Cooler and ice packs
- A plan for evacuation and for if family members are separated

Securing Your Home

Know how to secure your home in the event of damaging winds, storm surge and flooding.

Cover all of your windows, either with hurricane shutters or wood.

Although tape can prevent glass from shattering everywhere, be warned that tape does not prevent the window from breaking.

If possible, secure straps or clips to securely fasten your roof to the structure of your home.

Make sure all trees and shrubs are trimmed and clear rain gutters.

Reinforce your garage doors.

Bring in all outdoor furniture, garbage cans, decorations, and anything else that is not tied down.

If winds become strong, stay away from windows and doors and close, secure and brace internal doors.

Power Outages

In the event a storm should leave you without power, there are a few things to consider and help you be ready and stay safe outside of your normal hurricane preparedness.

- Gas: Make sure your tank is full far in advance of an approaching storm. Most people wait until the last minute, rush to get extra gas for cars and generators, and subsequently gas stations can run out early.
- ATMS: Have extra cash on hand in the event no ATMS in your area are accessible or working.
- Cell Phones: Charge your cell phone and limit use after power is out.
- A/C: This can be the most uncomfortable side effect of losing power during a storm. Try to prevent as much light from entering and warming the house by covering up your windows on the inside. If you have back-up or battery operated fans, don't run them unless you are in the room. Fans create a difference in perceived temperature but do not cool the room; instead they create a cooling effect by dispersing the heat off your skin. It is said they can actually add heat to a room just by running.
- Water: Fill bathtub and large containers with water for washing and flushing only.
- Food: Turn your fridge temperature down and/or freeze any food or drinking water that can be frozen if you expect a power outage. Here is a guide on freezing food: Freezing and Food Safety. Have a cooler with ice packs prepared to cool your drinks and snacks after power has been out for more than 4 hours. - Health/Safety: The CDC has a great guide on how to stay safe in the event of a power outage: Power Outages

Remember, any severe storm can be deadly and destructive. If you've survived a landfilling cyclone, you know the inconvenience and distress it can cause. One of the best tips to be prepared is knowing the cycle of a cyclone - Approach, Arrival & Aftermath. Prepare ahead of time and listen to the directions of officials for the approach. Secure your home, or find a safe shelter for its arrival, and know how to proceed safely during the aftermath.


The PVA members have just returned from the Winter Ski Clinic in Colorado. They had a wonderful time skiing and doing other activities in the winter wonder land of snow.

HOUSE PASSES SEVEN VETERAN-RELATED BILLS

Before leaving for a two-week recess, the House passed seven veteran-related bills. One of the House-passed bills, the Clear Communication for Veterans Claims Act (H.R. 1039), directs the VA to enter into an agreement with a federally-funded research and development center for an assessment of notice letters that the VA sends to claimants. PVA believes the VA should place greater emphasis on simplifying communications with veterans, and focus less on legalese. Therefore, we appreciate and strongly support efforts like this to help demystify the VA claims process. Meanwhile, the Deliver for Veterans Act (H.R. 877), would modify the VA's Adaptive Vehicle Grant Program to cover shipping costs for adaptive vehicles. This will help ensure that more veterans with service-related disabilities can access adaptive vehicles, regardless of their location or financial situation.

A third bill, the Fairness for Servicemembers and their Families Act of 2025 (H.R. 970), requires the VA to periodically review and report on the maximum coverage available under the Servicemembers' Group Life Insurance and Veterans' Group Life Insurance programs. The bill would ensure that life insurance packages for servicemembers and veterans adjust for increases in cost of living and inflation.

Finally, the Prioritizing Veterans' Survivors Act (H.R. 1228) aims to clarify the organization of the VA's Office of Survivors Assistance. Specifically, it seeks to elevate the Office of Survivors Assistance within the VA by placing it directly under the Office of the VA Secretary.

The three remaining bills were the VETT Act (H.R. 981), the Montgomery GI Bill Selected Reserves Tuition Fairness Act of 2025 (H.R. 983), and the Vietnam Veterans Liver Fluke Cancer Study Act (H.R. 586, as amended). A press release about these bills passing can be viewed here.

EO SUBCOMMITTEE HOLDS MARKUP

On April 9, the Economic Opportunity (EO) Subcommittee for the House Veterans' Affairs Committee held a markup on several pieces of legislation that PVA offered feedback on in a previous hearing.

The bills mainly focused on VA education benefits, such as the Post 9/11 GI Bill and the Veteran Readiness and Employment (VR&E) program. PVA provided extensive feedback on H.R. 1793, the Veterans Readiness and Employment Transparency Act of 2025, which would codify the outreach done by the VR&E program, as well as authorize VR&E experts to provide feedback through the Education Call Center, an existing help line that is available for student veterans using the Post 9/11 GI Bill. Currently, VR&E participants have no direct line to ask questions of VA when they encounter issues, and this bill seeks to solve that problem. The bill also establishes requirements for the VR&E program to offer information sessions to covered institutions of higher learning, as well as for school certifying officials. Several recommendations provided by PVA were incorporated into the legislation that we believe will strengthen the bill while avoiding unrealistic expectations of VR&E counselors.

Another bill PVA supported is H.R. 1458, the Veterans Education and Technical Skills (VETS) Opportunity Act of 2025. This bill will authorize certain independent study programs approved by VA to allow for increased hybrid delivery models. The legislation would require hybrid programs to have "regular and substantive interaction between students and instructors," which should help protect veterans from predatory schools and allow VA to disapprove programs that serve no benefit to veterans. This is important for SCI/D veterans who may prefer online education which can be more accessible for them.

Finally, the subcommittee also passed an amended version of the Automotive Support Services to Improve Safe Transportation (ASSIST) Act (H.R. 1364). The ASSIST Act would clarify the equipment that can be provided to disabled veterans as part of the medical benefits package to adapt their vehicles by providing greater flexibility regarding what can be classified as "adaptive equipment." Passage of this legislation is a priority for PVA. Please send a message to your members of Congress here.

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

FULL HOUSE COMMITTEE HEARING FOCUSING ON BIOMEDICAL INNOVATION AT VA

On April 1, the House Veterans' Affairs Committee held a hearing titled, "Harnessing Biomedical Innovation: Modernizing VA Healthcare for the Future." The committee invited several companies to share how they contribute to medical advances and support for veterans.

Participants represented at the hearing were Boston Scientific, Podimetrics, Philips North America, and the University of Arizona Health Sciences Department. The witnesses represented experts in the field of diabetes and sleep apnea, as well as representatives for medical technology companies that include radiology equipment and other critical pieces of care delivery.

The hearing was unexpectedly contentious along party lines where members of the majority praised the witnesses and their medical contributions to the VA and minority members stressed the need for staff and funding that allows for appropriate delivery of care to implement the new technologies.

SENATE INTRODUCES COMPANION BILL TO IMPROVE VETERANS' ACCESSIBILITY AT VA

The Veterans Accessibility Act (S. 1383) has been reintroduced in the Senate by Senators Rick Scott (R-FL), Kirsten Gillibrand (D-NY), Jerry Moran (R-KS), and Richard Blumenthal (D-CT). The Veterans Accessibility Act is the companion bill for the Veterans Accessibility Advisory Committee Act (H.R. 1147), which was introduced earlier this year by Representatives David Valadao (R-CA) and Morgan McGarvey (D-KY).

The two bills have small differences, but the intent is the same, to create a Federal Advisory Committee (FAC) focused on accessibility across the VA, ensuring that it is in full compliance with federal disability laws and offering guidance on ways to improve programs, facilities, and delivery of care. The FAC will be comprised of 15-members ranging from veterans service organizations focused on various disabilities, accessibility experts currently working for the VA, and outside stakeholders with an expertise in disability access.

Last Congress, the House bill cleared the chamber but not the Senate. We want to see the bill signed into law. You can help by sending your members of Congress a message urging their support for the legislation. You can find our PVAction Force campaign here.

SENATOR BLUMENTHAL REINTRODUCES BILL TO IMPROVE CLAIMS PROCESS FOR ASSAULT SURVIVORS

The Ranking Member of the Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee, Senator Richard Blumenthal (D-CT), has reintroduced S. 1245, the Servicemember and Veteran Empowerment and Support (SAVES) Act. The SAVES Act has been a priority piece of legislation that expands authorized evidence for survivors of military sexual trauma (MST). The bill would also authorize mental health conditions related to MST such as post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), anxiety, and depression. The legislation seeks to improve the benefits process for survivors by allowing veterans to have their compensation and pension exam done by the VA or a contracted provider. Lastly, it would allow former guard and/or reservists to access mental health counseling provided by the VA.

PVA SERVES AS PANELIST AT THE PTE WORLD AIR TRAVEL CONFERENCE

On April 9, Chief Policy Officer Heather Ansley was asked to present as part of a panel of experts on accessibility and air travel at PTE (Passenger Terminal Expo) World in Madrid, Spain. PTE World is the leading international airport conference and exhibition. The panel discussion titled, "From Raising Awareness to Taking Action to Making Progress," featured speakers from the UK, USA, and Switzerland. Discussions included advocating to increase disability access in air travel, steps that airlines and airports can take to improve the travel process, and the future of accessible air travel.

HOUSE VETERANS' AFFAIRS DAMA SUBCOMMITTEE HOLDS MARKUP

On April 9, the House Veterans' Affairs Subcommittee on Disability Assistance and Memorial Affairs (DAMA) conducted a markup on six bills, including H.R. 1286, Simplifying Forms for Veterans Claims Act, and H.R. 2303, Board of Veterans' Appeals Attorney Retention and Backlog Reduction Act. WORK ON SECTION 107 OF THE SENATOR ELIZABETH DOLE ACT BEGINS

A provision in the Senator Elizabeth Dole 21st Century Veterans Healthcare and Benefits Improvement Act (P.L. 118-210) requires the VA to establish a working group that would guide the department's implementation of bill section 107. Specifically, the section requires the VA Secretary to develop a strategic plan to implement value-based care in the Veterans Health Administration (VHA). Among other things, the strategic plan must include the current state of VHA, an assessment of the current model of health care delivery used by the department in its medical facilities, and an assessment of VHA's future capacity needs over a five-year period, beginning on the date of the enactment of this Act. Additionally, within 180 days after the VA submits the strategic plan to Congress, the Secretary, coordinating through the Center for Innovation for Care and Payment, will commence a three-year pilot program implementing the strategic plan for the delivery of primary care, inpatient and outpatient mental health treatment, inpatient and outpatient substance abuse treatment, spinal cord injury and disorder care, and polytrauma care. PVA was one of the groups chosen to serve on the working group and we intend to update you on its efforts as we are able. HOUSE VETERANS' AFFAIRS DAMA SUBCOMMITTEE OVERSIGHT HEARING

On April 9, the House Veterans' Affairs Subcommittee on Disability Assistance and Memorial Affairs (DAMA) conducted an oversight hearing titled, "Examining VA Efforts to Decrease Delays in Veterans' Disability Compensation Claims." Representatives from the VA included the Assistant Deputy Undersecretary, Field Operations Mr. Kenneth Smith; Executive Director Benefits and Memorial Services Mr. Robert Orifici; and from the American Federation of Government Employees, President James Swartz. PVA NEEDS YOU - SIGN TODAY!

Over the last couple of years, we have seen VA health care staffing shortages, a lack of investment in infrastructure, and an overall growing trend towards care in the community. Memorial Day

Honoring Tom Corey

May Marks an important month for the military veterans of the United States. This is the month we honor those that have passed before us on Memorial Day. This makes it an appropriate moment to celebrate the life and accomplishments of a true hero, Thomas H Corey.

Tom was born on December 24, 1944 in Detroit Michigan. He was drafted into the US Army in December 1966. By May 1967 he was serving in Vietnam as a combat infantryman and squad leader with the First cavalry, first battalion, 12th cavalry. On January 31, 1968 during the Tet offensive Thomas was struck by enemy fire in Quang Tri province, resulting in a spinal cord injury that left him paralyzed and a quadriplegic. After his injury he returned to Detroit for rehabilitation and in 1972 he relocated to West Palm Beach, Florida, where he immersed himself in community affairs and became a passionate advocate for veterans. His Personal experience fueled his determination to improve the lives of his fellow service men and women. Mr. Corey founded the local Vietnam veterans of America chapter 25. He also served with the Florida chapter of the Paralyzed Veterans of America and was a strong advocate everywhere he went. He led delegations to Vietnam 16 times working on the fullest possible accounting of those still missing in action. Mr. Corey's relentless efforts earned him a nomination for the Nobel peace prize. He dedicated over 15 years as an ombudsman and program specialist at his home VA the West Palm Beach VA Medical Center. His unwavering commitment to veterans rights and well-being left an indelible mark on the community and in the nation. He served as a key member on the Fisher house board and always focused on caring for those who served and continue to serve our great nation. The West Palm Beach VA Medical Center is now named the Thomas H Corey VA. Medical Center, This is more than a tribute to Tom, It is a commitment to honor his life's work.




